Welcoming us to Spokane County and to the 2024 Greater Northwest Rail Summit is four term Spokane County Commissioner Al French. Commissioner French sits on the governing board of the Palouse-Coulee City Railroad (the largest state owned short-line railroad in the Northwest). Spokane County also owns the Geiger Spur which serves many industrial users along with the recently completed Transload facility which will be opening soon. Commissioner French Chairs the Spokane Regional Transportation Council and serves as a Board Member for the Washington State Freight Mobility Strategic Investment Board, the Washington County Road Administration Board, and the state Transportation Improvement Board.
